Maneuvering obstacles and leading with passion

You are the first Indian American to be elected to the Iowa Legislature. What does that mean to you and what is the historical meaning to the community?

I did not run to be the first Indian American legislator. It did not even cross my mind. My friends encouraged me to run because they knew that I cared for the district citizens and loved Iowa.

Being the first at anything is never easy. What did you do and what do you do to find inspiration, motivation and encouragement?

It was not easy to be the first Asian American to win Iowa Legislature position in 2002. I had a lot of bumps in the road. My colleagues did not know how to react to my win and how to treat me. However, I was blessed to have great Democrat and Republican mentors like Senator Harkin, Dick Myers, Mike Gronstal, Patty Judge, Suki Cell, Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, Wally Horn, Senator Grassley, Ambassador Branstad, Clarence Hoffman, Ron Corbett, Christopher Rants, and Elizabeth Jacobs. Since I had from support both sides of the aisle it was very easy for me to jump over the hurdles and shrug off the obstacles.

What led you to get involved in politics? What advice would you have for those who may wish to get more involved in politics or run for office?

My passion for education, women's rights and my love for Iowa were very obvious to my district citizens. I was encouraged by my friends to run for the state office. My advice to those who have passion for their community should get involved and run for local/state/national office.

What things are you doing in your post public servant life?

During my public servant life I have made friendship with several Democratic and Republican Party members. Two years back my Republican friend Gentry Collins and I formed the LLC called "Bright Future Iowa (BFI)". Gentry Collins and I are working in a bipartisan way to make Iowa Number 1 in Renewable Energy.

Growing up on the Southside of Des Moines was a wonderfully diverse experience. Our family lived right in the middle of families with Italian, Irish, Asian and Latino heritages. My mother was an immigrant from the Philippines who fled to Hawaii during WWII and my father, an airforce WWII veteran, had solid roots planted in Des Moines, Iowa. They met on a college campus in Colorado, so I always consider my existence a result of a very serendipitous chance meeting.

The early 60's was a nostalgic time, when there was a 'grandma' living in every other home, the front doors were always open, kids played in the streets, and the biggest fight you had was over rules to a kick-ball game. I grew up in a loving family with lovely neighbors.

However, it was also a time when women did not always work outside the home, and if they did, were not always respected in the workplace. Racism was alive and well, but starting to be labeled as 'bad behavior'. I did not know



then how politics and war would change the opportunities I would enjoy in later life as a young woman.

Politics was the farthest thing from my mind when I campaigned in the mid 70's for a family friend. Katie Shinstine Holschuh, a single mom of 3 boys, who was a strong, capable woman running for Polk County Recorder. She brought me out of my shyness, and in typical "Katie" form, encouraged me to knock on stranger's doors, engage in conversation and get involved in the community. Women holding public office, what a novel idea! The seed had been planted!!

I started working in the Polk County Recorder's Office the summer after graduating from

high school, and returned full time after a short year at Arizona State University. Katie became my mentor for all things 'politics'. I worked on local and a few presidential campaigns. The Polk County Courthouse and our office would always be a campaign stop for presidential candidates, and I was always invited to meet them. One of those candidates was former President Jimmy Carter. I helped work the polls, wrote post cards, made contact lists and knocked on doors.

As I watched the peaceful transfer of power on television, it occurred to me that I had met our new president, sitting in Katie's office, sipping coffee, while he asked for her endorsement. Similarly, I have had the honor to meet candidates Bill Clinton, Hillary Clinton, Barack Obama and Joe Biden at small gatherings in someone's home. Those one-on-one opportunities left a lasting impression

on me, and to this day, I truly believe success is made if you talk with people at the grass roots level.

I have always felt that county government is the best form of governance, because you are voting for a person from your district, your church or your school. A person who lives in your community and in most cases is someone you know personally, or a friend knows

and endorses. My experience tells me that in most cases, you can get an elected county official on the phone to answer questions or concerns.

Interest in local and county races has evolved because citizens are beginning to understand the importance of choosing people who create public policies that affect the neighborhood where you live. Whether it be the creation of bike trails, taxes, assessments, school funding, school programs, weed control, access to mental health resources, or any other community issues. It is important that we take the time to meet the candidates and vote in ALL local races as well as state and federal elections.

I love my job as Polk County Recorder because I can make a positive impact every day on people who need our assistance by creating a helpful atmosphere and knowledgeable staff. Public service is honorable, rewarding and humbling work. I encourage anyone seeking a political office to stay committed to serve others with kindness, listen to constituents, even those with issues on which you may disagree, and when there are decisions to make, always do the RIGHT thing.

I leave you with my favorite quote and words to live by from Lao-Tze, an ancient Chinese philosopher:

"Watch your thoughts, for they become words; Watch your words, for they become actions; Watch your actions, for they become character; Watch your character, for it becomes destiny." Lao - Tze


