From the Desk of the Democratic National Committee Chair

You are the third Black person and the second Black man to serve as Chair of the Democratic National Committee (DNC). What does this mean to you and what is the historical meaning to the community?

It is not lost on me that Black voters have long been the backbone of the party that I now have the honor of helping to lead. I'm always mindful of our history, and I'm proud of the progress that we've made both as a country and a party.

I was born to a teen mom, and raised by my grandparents. My grandmother had an 8th grade education, she picked cotton and cleaned houses. My grandfather had a 4th grade education, and he paved roads to help us get by.

Society often labeled them as simple, but they were rich in terms of their values: hard work, loyalty, respect – those are the values that underpin who we are as a Black community, and those are the values that I bring to work with me every day as Chair of the DNC.

This organization is 176 years old and during that

time, Black people have gone from being denied access to the ballot to facing unjust laws, state-sanctioned violence, and intimidation tactics that prevented us from exercising our most fundamental rights... all the way to the current moment where I have the privilege of serving as DNC Chair as we head into an election cycle where voters will be casting their ballots in South Carolina's historic first-in-the-nation Democratic presidential primary later this week. That's a testament to the progress that Democrats are leading, and that we need to continue to build on.

What are some goals, projects, initiatives and/or objectives you would like to accomplish during your term?

When I first took on the role of Chair of the DNC, my first priority was to level up on critical, early investments to Democratic state parties across the country, delivering the tools and resources they need to be successful up and down the ballot. Today, I'm proud that the Democratic Party is stronger than ever before, and with each passing year, we've only strengthened the work that we are doing to reach voters.

Black History Month 2024 Edition

In 2021, President Biden and I announced a \$23 million investment to support all 57 state parties and territories to help elect Democrats up and down the ballot and build long-term party infrastructure in every corner of the country. This included a first-of-it-kind Red State Fund to specifically invest in historically red states.

As we head into election year, the DNC's investments are all about electing Democrats who will serve the American people, from local offices to the Oval Office.

We're also continuing to put the work in early to engage and mobilize Black voters well ahead of November's election. Throughout last year, I've been on the ground, hearing about what matters most to voters and engaging in continuous conversations with Black women and Black men through our Seat At the Table and Chop It Up programs, respectively, to listen, learn, and highlight some of our most important accomplishments, including:

- Under President Biden, we've appointed more Black women to the appellate courts than all other presidents combined. And we confirmed Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson to serve as the first Black woman on the Supreme Court.
- When Republicans stalled the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act, President Biden used his executive power to ban federal chokeholds, limit no-knock entries, and pardon those convicted of simple federal marijuana possession.
- Democrats have also delivered a historic \$7.3 billion to HBCUs.
- Even more: We've protected our pensions, and fought to ensure folks have the right to retire with dignity. We've put Black maternal health equity at the forefront of our agenda. And President Biden and Vice President Harris are just getting started when it comes to delivering wins for our community.

My team and I will continue to put in the work to make sure that Black voters know what is at stake in 2024. It is a race between hope and fear. And we know hope must always prevail.

Being one of a historical few in anything is never easy. What do you do to find inspiration, motivation and encouragement?

As the husband of a Black woman, and the father of two Black boys, I am inspired day in and day out by my family. I also find motivation and encouragement to work in politics and to do this job in the memory of my grandparents. My grandparents, who didn't have a whole lot of formal education, but who believed in the greatness of this country. They were hard-working people — and sometimes life was not always easy for them. I've always seen politics and working for the Democratic Party as a way to advocate for folks like them. That is my 'why' and a major reason behind my work.

And I would be remiss if I did not also mention the profound impact of my dear friend and mentor, the late congressman and civil rights giant John Lewis — a national treasure who taught me the power of getting into good trouble, necessary trouble, in the fight for justice.

What advice would you have for those who may wish to get more involved with politics or run for office?

There is no one way to get involved, but it can start with something as simple as having a desire or passion for making people's lives better.

Start Local. Whether you are interested in national politics or state politics, I offer the same advice: start local. Begin your journey in communities in which you have a connection. Starting local can help expand the opportunities available to you at the beginning of your career.

Incredible opportunities can be had in a district office or mayor's office. The important thing is to get experience and build relationships. Relationships are key to a successful career in politics.

Character counts, so you must work as if someone is always watching. Nearly everyone in politics started at the bottom. You could be working alongside your future boss, and your actions as an intern or an entry-level staffer will be remembered by others for years to come. It's simple: treat others with kindness and respect, and be fair and kind to others.

Keep developing your skill set! Politics can be fastpaced and competitive. New methods in the field are constantly being developed. You should always be searching for ways to learn new skills and advance existing skills to support the work you are doing.

Is there anything else you would like to share with our readers?

The 2024 election will be the most important election of our lifetimes. I know that a lot of people say that for every election, but who you vote for in the 2024 presidential election will determine the future of American democracy and the fundamental freedoms that we hold most dear.

I know that I don't have to remind our community of the stakes of this election — because we are feeling the stakes in our everyday lives. We're seeing judges and politicians telling women what they can and can't do with their own bodies. We're watching Black History being removed from school textbooks and curriculums. And we're fighting back against people who are once again actively trying to prevent us from exercising our sacred right to vote.

This year is our moment to stand up and fight back against this tide of injustice and pave a new road forward for our country — a new road where all of us are included and where we all have a fair shot at the American Dream.
